#### Welcome and thank you for joining us for the Emergence 2025 Triple Bill programme.

Celebrating our seventh year, the 2025 touring programme features three brand new dance productions performed by an international cast of brilliant dance artists. I have admired the work of Sofia, Sarah, Yukiko and Lisa for many years and I am extremely grateful for the pieces they have created and shaped for this year's company.

All three pieces in the programme share a common theme and driving force – the pleasure of movement.

'CHIMERA' by Sofia Nappi explores her signature and expressive movement language and draws inspiration from the mythical chimera creature. With a strong focus on sensation and the creation of fantasies, the work explores the transformation of individual stories, weaving the dancers' individuality together to reveal a unified community.

'153 8s' by SAY (Sarah Golding and Yukiko Masui) is a double-casted piece, inspired by the concept of a music album, using four distinct tracks. Each track has its own unique qualities, creating a piece that is both explosive and electrifying. With carefully selected music from artists they have strong connections with, the piece showcases the individual talents of each dancer, highlighting their unique strengths and styles, while also fostering a powerful sense of unity.

The final piece in tonight's programme is 'EUPHORIA', a new work created in collaboration with the dancers and our wonderful assistant choreographer, Lisa Marie Robinson (Joss Arnott Dance Artist/Emergence '23 alumna). The piece investigates the complexities of our ego, demonstrated through the interplay between choreography and new music by my long-term, mastermind composer James Keane. The work explores the dancers' journey to euphoria, allowing them to lose their inhibitions and become the best versions of themselves.

Thank you to Sofia, Sarah, Yukiko and Lisa for their artistry and generosity. To the University of Salford and our colleagues; Yue Ying Ho, for being a fantastic Rehearsal Assistant; Tim France; our wonderful collaborators and team; and, of course, our amazing Programme Leader, Debbie Milner.



## JOSS ARNOTT ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Founding Joss Arnott Dance in 2010, Joss is an internationally award-winning Artistic Director and choreographer who has been continuously supported and commissioned by leading dance agencies, venues and funding organisations.

Joss is in demand as a choreographer, having been commissioned to create work for the UK's leading professional dance companies and dance conservatoires. His artistic vision is fuelled by creating a portfolio of work for a range of audiences that are at the heart of everything he produces, including indoor, outdoor and family-orientated productions.

Joss strives for innovation of the highest quality and curates world-class collaborations for Joss Arnott Dance which became evident in 2015 with

the company's 5th-anniversary touring programme that featured live music from the world's premier solo percussionist, Dame Evelyn Glennie.

With a commitment and passion for talent development, Joss has been a Focus Group Artist for Sadler's Well's National Youth Dance Company, BBC Young Dancer consultant and has worked with and produced multiple works for the National Centre for Advanced Training Schemes. He was previously short-listed for One Dance UK's People's Choice Award, has been a Trustee for Dance United Yorkshire and is currently an Associate Artist at Lincoln Arts Centre.

2018 marked the year of the newly formed partnership between Joss Arnott Dance and the University of Salford with the launch of their MA Dance: Performance and Professional Practices programme that established EMERGENCE.

Over the past four years, Joss's interest in cross art form collaboration has been demonstrated further, working with the University of Salford's music, costume, fashion design and animation programmes within the School of Arts, Media and Creative Technology on productions for both Emergence and Joss Arnott Dance.

Debbie has over twenty years' experience of working as a professional dance artist. During this time, she has enjoyed a successful and varied career performing, choreographing with regional, national and international dance artists and companies, community groups, arts organisations and cultural industries.

Debbie has a proven track record in Artistic Lead and Rehearsal Director roles. Debbie was the Artistic Director of the all-male undergraduate company EdgeFWD, which was short-listed for The Times Higher Education (THE) Awards for Excellence and Innovation in the Arts in 2012. Debbie was also the Artistic Lead for the successful postgraduate dance company—12 degrees North. She is a member of the NATD

(National Association of Teachers of Dancing) and is an alumni of Aurora, Advance HE's leadership development initiative for women.

Debbie has been working in Higher Education for 16 years, receiving a Chancellor's Award for Teaching Excellence in 2011 and short-listed for One Dance UK's Inspirational Lecturer at College, University or Conservatoire Award in 2022. Debbie is currently the Subject Group Head for Dance and teaches across all the dance programmes delivering contemporary technique, contextual studies, dance pedagogy and creative entrepreneurship. Her research and teaching practice considers how we can best prepare and support dance students so that they are industry ready and can graduate with the information and confidence necessary to navigate their chosen career path.





#### SOFIA NAPPI

#### **GUEST CHOREOGRAPHER 2024/25**

The international choreographer and dancer from Italy trained at the Ailey School in New York and deepened her studies internationally. The close contact with the Hofesh Shechter Company and her involvement with Ohad Naharin's Gaga language had a particular influence on her work.

Nappi is Artistic Director and co-founder of KOMOCO, supported by the contemporary dance collective Sosta Palmizi in Turin and her first muses Adriano Popolo Rubbio and Paolo Piancastelli. Already with her first pieces for KOMOCO/Sofia Nappi, she won the Introdans Partner Award 2021 at the Rotterdam International Duet Choreography Competition 2021 as well as the First Prize, the Critics' Prize and the Production Prize of the Tanja-Liedtke-Stiftung at the 35th International Competition for Choreography Hannover 2021.

KOMOCO/Sofia Nappi has performed in Germany, Austria, the USA, Italy, the Netherlands, Israel, France, Albania, Spain, the Canary Islands, Mexico, Kosovo, Belgium and Hungary as well as at numerous Italian and international festivals and dance platforms, including La Biennale Di Venezia, the Albania Meeting Dance Festival, the RomaEuropa Festival, MASDANZA, the COLOURS International Dance Festival in Stuttgart and the Teatro del Canal Madrid.

Sofia regularly collaborates as a freelance choreographer with renowned international ballet and dance companies: In December 2021, she staged her piece 'Holelah', originally created for La Biennale Di Venezia 2019, with the ballet company of the Nationaltheater Mannheim. 2023 saw the world premières of 'Tagadà' for the Staatsballett Hannover and 'Moving Cloud' for Scottish Dance Theatre as a contribution to the bill 'Celtic Connections'.



### SAY (SARAH GOLDING AND YUKIKO MASUI) GUEST CHOREOGRAPHERS 2024/25

Sarah Golding has received nominations for a British Black Theatre Award for her movement direction for the West End's 'Cruise' (Duchess Theatre). Sarah trained at Trinity Laban and received a BA and MA in dance performance (Transitions Dance Company). Once graduated, she became a dancer with Lîla Dance in 2014 where she toured nationally and rurally. She has performed for theatre companies and choreographers including the Royal Court (The Internet Is Serious Business), Bang Bang Bang group, Darcy Wallace, Quang Kien Van, Cathy Waller, Adam Russell. Sarah has most recently performed in the West End and with the world touring cast of 'STOMP'.

Sarah's contemporary choreographic credits include BalletBoyz (The Intro) which featured in their Deluxe tour; Phoenix Dance Theatre (KALENA) mapdance 21 (STATE), 'Blood and Belief' (U.Mi-1 London Fashion week 21); 'TRANSIT-20' (Dance film collaboration with South African dancers) and Trinity Laban (conversations with x). Sarah's theatre choreographic credits also include 'Wizard of Oz' (Watermill Theatre), 'Little Women' (Park Theatre), 'Candide' (Mountview) and 'Primetime' (Royal Court).

Sarah choreographed the workshop presentation of the new adaptation of 'Jekyll and Hyde' (produced by Lambert Jackson Productions). Sarah was recently movement director on 'KENREX' for Sheffield Theatres and Southwark Playhouse.

Yukiko Masui has been the recipient of a Choreography Award from DanceXchange, an Akram Khan Mentoring Award from Sky Arts and is a Work Place Artist at The Place. Yukiko, originally from Tokyo, Japan, started her training in Hip Hop, Ballroom Latin where she developed her passion for dance and movement.

She moved to London to train in contemporary dance where she completed her MA as part of Transitions Dance Company. Masui has worked as a choreographer and movement director, in theatre including 'Miss Julie' (Southwark Playhouse); 'Toy Show the Musical' by RTE (Dublin Convention Centre); 'A Little Night Music' (Storyhouse); 'Say Yes to Tess' (Leeds Playhouse); 'Guy: A New Musical' (The Bunker); 'Taming of the Shrew' for Two Gents; and 'Urine Town' (London College of Music).

Contemporary dance choreography includes 'Femme Spreading' (Norrdans); 'For Seasons' (mapdance); 'Dream Deprivation' (London Contemporary Dance School); 'Drowning in Your Own Sins' (Northern School of Contemporary Dance); 'State of Readiness' (London Studio Centre); 'Break it Down' (Trinity Laban); 'The Night Is Darkest Just Before the Dawn' (National Youth Dance Wales). Her own works 'Unbox', 'It Takes Two Too' and 'Falling Family' have been commissioned and toured internationally (Birmingham Hippodrome, Norrlands Opera and more).

Performer's credit includes 'Carmen' on international tour for Agudo Dance Company; Norrdans on international tour; 'Tempo' (Sadler's Wells); 'Speak Louder Than Words' on UK tour for Cathy Waller Company; 'Still I Rise' for TRIBE; 'Smack That' (Barbican); and 'Saving Face' (Curve). Film and Commercial work include Nike, Coldplay, So You Think You Can Dance (UK) and Ministry of Sound.

#### SAY

SAY was founded by Sarah Golding and Yukiko Masui in 2019. They focus their work on challenging the elitism often associated with contemporary dance. As a duo, they have created 'SAY: AF' - a dance film with the international festival Dance Umbrella. They have recently been featured dancers in 'The Marvels' and were dance captains and performers in the Commonwealth Opening Ceremony 2022.

SAY was commissioned to create a piece for National Dance Company Wales, 'SAY Something' which toured nationally and internationally. SAY have made pieces for



Trinity Laban, London Contemporary Dance School and often work as movement directors for various productions. They have recently worked on 'The Effect' at **National Theatre** and 'The Shed', NY and 'Romeo & Juliet' starring Tom Holland, directed by Jamie Lloyd at Duke of York's Theatre. Co-produced by The Place, they toured their first show 'the album' nationally and internationally and are now developing their latest piece 'HOT in HeRe'.

'CHIMERA' explores the tension and beauty of individuality within a collective. Drawing from Greek mythology, the Chimera—an impossible fusion of lion, goat, and serpent—becomes a metaphor for the dancers themselves. Each of the 20 artists brings their own unique cultural, artistic, and physical traits, creating a dynamic ensemble that's more than the sum of its parts, much like the mythical creature.

Through KOMOCO's research and the 'Kreaturistic Character', the dancers dive deep into their instincts, playfulness, and subconscious. Together, they form a creature made of distinct stories, bodies, and energies. At times goofy like a goat, fluid like a serpent, and powerful like a lion, the group celebrates both individuality and unity. Every dancer remains connected to their own essence, while contributing to a collective that constantly evolves.

'CHIMERA' isn't about following a linear narrative. Instead, it takes us on a journey through a fantastical world where individuality and togetherness coexist. It's about embracing our personal uniqueness while recognizing we're part of something larger—reflecting the ever-shifting balance between self and community, where each dancer's transformation fuels the whole.

'153 8s' is a double-casted dance piece built around four original tracks created by musicians SAY regularly collaborate with. It is all about the magic that happens when dance and music are in sync. It's a high-energy exploration of rhythm and movement, creating a space where both art forms share the spotlight equally.

The piece is split into four parts, each inspired by a different sound and vibe. Each track has its own feel, shaping the way the movement comes to life. While the timing is always tight and structured, every section has its own unique energy based on what the music brings out.

At the heart of the choreography is counting—specifically learning fast, intricate phrases built around groups of '153 8s'. Is all about connecting to the rhythm and letting the music guide the movement.

'EUPHORIA' explores the physical and emotional responses of a conflicted ego, that allows the performers to delve into the three ego components (id, ego and superego) to discover how they behave, whilst questioning what they allow us to reveal and experience.

With an emphasis on embracing individuality and the importance of being present, this new dance production uncovers each performer's journey of trying to break away from social norms and finding their true self, investigating both introvert and extrovert behaviours of their ego.

Questioning what is real and what is façade, 'EUPHORIA' explores the moments when we feel both in and out of control whilst striving for our inhibited self to become empowered and stronger.

Demonstrating a display of youthful, euphoric energy through dance and music interplay, 'EUPHORIA' also portrays raw, hopeful storytelling threaded together through echoes and memories that enables us to remember where we have been, where we are now and where we are going in relation to both our individual and collective journeys.



INTERVAL (20 minutes)

#### **5 MINUTES WITH SOFIA NAPPI**

Hello, I'm Sofia Nappi. I'm an independent choreographer, and I work for different theatres, companies and institutions, but I am also the Artistic Director of my own company, KOMOCO, which is based in Italy and tours internationally.

I have had the pleasure to be invited by Joss to choreograph on the Emergence dancers, and it was a great honour. It's also the first time for me to work as an independent choreographer in the United Kingdom. I've been to Scotland before though, creating for Scottish Dance Theatre, and I'm really excited to work with, like very young people ready to soak up information and to be really open to grow.

It's such a diverse group with a lot of different backgrounds, personalities, artistic interests, different characters and bodies - so I was really inspired by them and I decided to draw more an idea of a narrative inspiration working with the dancers.

So the word, Chimera, came to my mind which is a mythological creature made of different parts; a snake, a goat and a lion. I connected this idea to the research as the Chimera is made of different parts, but somehow it makes this very mysterious other worldly creature, and so how the dancers are with their individuality and storytelling through the research, they can create this one, whole creature, called the Chimera.

I would like the audience to experience a sense of group, community. It's always up to the viewer, like any form of art. I believe, it's always like, when you look at the painting it's very subjective, what you receive from it. But I believe, and hope I can bring a sense of group to the space. Union. Something that brings a wave of energy together, rather than enlightening the one, and within that, the dualities and the playfulness of it.



#### **5 MINUTES WITH SAY (SARAH GOLDING AND YUKIKO MASUI)**

Y: We've been working on an idea of really physicalising the music with the dancers, where we chose songs that we really love and from artists we know personally to really highlight their music. Within the piece we have a range of music as we wanted to have a musical journey throughout the tracks.

S: We listened a lot to the music and thought, ok... what's the vibe of this song? What do the lyrics say? What energy is behind the beat? We usually give some tasks to the dancers but we often generate a lot of material. We'll be in the corners of the space making up material, one of us will teach and then the other person will jump in, so it's been a process that's explored both of those things.

Y: We often explore grooves, so we listen to the music and question how would we groove if we wanted to dance to this track. We have smashing phrases that we generated and shared with the dancers, but we also have moments of groove on the spot so that audiences can experience a juicy groove that you can hear and see.

I remember when, even before Joss asked us to make the piece, we were like, we would really love to work with Emergence because in our heads, Emergence has such a clear physical idea as a company. For us, it's edgy, punchy and full of raw talent and energy. So we've been really blessed to be working with this year's company.

S: And also, because there's so many dancers, there's 20 and it's very rare that we get the opportunity to work with that many artists that are skilled in this way and our piece is double cast, so we've got 2 casts of 10 and it's been really interesting to switch out and work with the different energies and strengths in each group. There's definitely strengths in different areas and that's really, really amazing to see.

S: Within this work, I think what we would love the audience to feel by the end of it, is that they want to be in it. They want to go party! They want to like hang out with the dancers. They want to download all the tracks. I also think we would love the audience to feel that they want to have an involvement in that world somehow, whether it's through being physical or just like listening to the music. I think that's something that we always try and create by the end of our work.



#### **5 MINUTES WITH JOSS ARNOTT AND LISA MARIE ROBINSON**

J: Our work for Emergence this year is heavily influenced by new and original music by James Keane and the emotional drivers behind it. We've been exploring this with the dancers through an in-depth creative process that has led to the piece overall, demonstrating the dancer's journeys from both a physical and emotional state of stuckness leading them to euphoria, acceptance, release and vitality - whilst embracing their individuality and each another.

Our goal from the beginning was wanting the dancer's inhibited-self to become more empowered and stronger so they could experience something new and challenge themselves both through the process and also performing the work.

L: As the piece has evolved, we have worked also with this idea of memories and echoes. Working and being inspired by the creativity of the dancers has inspired this core structural theme throughout the piece and reminding us where we have been, where we are now and inviting us in to where we are going.

J: The concept of exploring the ego was also a real interest of mine from the beginning. We've been investigating the idea of conflict between the 3 components of the ego (id, ego and superego) and delving into their behaviours by exploring how they can be physicalised and what do they allow us to reveal, experience? Alongside this, we've been exploring how our ego responds to different music styles and genres, whilst also breaking down the ego to show the complexities, layers and stories we have as people to share through dance.

This piece is probably the most musically diverse I've ever made – it is really ambitious and features many different dance genres - there's classical, contemporary, house music, there's big band influences so it's quite a musical feast for audiences to experience which I hope they enjoy. James has done such a brilliant job and it's been an absolute dream to work with.


L: I've found the music super integral to my choreographing. It's such an amazing piece of craftsmanship that has excited, challenged and pushed us both choreographically and creatively!

J: Throughout the process, we've been teaching material to the dancers for them to embody the stylistics qualities of my work that comes from a range of dance techniques and influences from pop culture. There have been a lot of collaborative and creative tasks where the dancers have generated their own material.

We've also collaborated with MA Fashion Design this year who have designed and made all of the dancer's costumes which has been a wonderful experience to be involved in.

We have 20 dancers this year which is brilliant, it's our biggest cohort yet so it's been really moving actually to see that energy that the dancers are giving to the piece and how they're developing. They're a really special group of people and they've offered us so much to the process. Their creativity is incredible and their willingness and grit to develop the work is really inspiring.

L: It has been an absolute pleasure to work with such a talented group of dancers, they have brought such an amazing energy to the whole process. I'm super grateful to have had the opportunity to work alongside Joss and the dancers, they have left me really inspired.



J: I'd like audiences to appreciate the variety and scope of what we've been exploring from the creative process to stage. 'EUPHORIA' is very on brand for me but it's allowed me to explore new processes and elements of storytelling so I'm really excited to see how the audience react to the dancers and what they have to offer as artists, how they can be moved by the dancers and how the audience can enjoy a varied range of music in the piece.

L: I'd also like the audience to appreciate and be in awe of the dancer's creativity, talent and energy, the amazing music and Joss's creativity.

J: There's been so much hard work and graft gone into making the piece what it is and I hope that comes across for the audience, for them to enjoy and to be entertained by what they're watching on stage. We ultimately want the audience to relate to a universal message of embracing ourselves and join us in celebrating our love for seeing what dance, music and production can all achieve together to create a really moving and uplifting experience for everyone.





Ozzy Berzin-Cohen (he/they)

Ozzy Berzin-Cohen is a queer artist and swimmer from London. Born with talipes and never expected to walk, he ended up becoming a swimmer and later discovered his passion for dance at 14. His journey into dance was unconventional, starting with commercial styles before discovering contemporary dance during GCSEs and A-Levels (2016-2020). He then joined The Place CAT Scheme (2019-2020) and went on to complete a BA (Hons) in Dance at Falmouth University (2020-2023). During his training, Ozzy choreographed a full-length work, and performed in pieces by choreographers such as Simon Birch, Kevin Turner and Katrina Brown. Alongside his degree, Ozzy choreographed and danced in student films, performed at Tate St Ives, and stayed politically active in Cornwall.

After graduating, Ozzy spent a year freelancing, working with companies such as Théâtre Volière, Mad Jacks Dance Theatre, Indigo Dance Company and independent choreographers including Finnleigh Zach Dance in Paris.

His freelance journey took him to Prague, where he trained closely with Lenka Vagnerová & Company, gaining deep insights into their repertoire and practice. He also completed intensives with Hofesh Shechter, KOMOCO, Rambert and Crystal Pite.

Ozzy's movement practice is grounded in floorwork, gaga, and release, while he continues to refine his technical skills in Cunningham and ballet. Alongside performing, he has pursued his choreographic work, conducting research for two new pieces exploring the unknown in the natural world and its physical and scientific processes.

Beyond dance, Ozzy is a qualified swim teacher and lifeguard and has completed several long-distance swims in Cornwall and the Lake District. He has over 10 years' experience in youth work and keyworking, and can always be found swimming in a lake, climbing a tree, the studio, or the vegan aisle of the zero-waste store.

#### Faye Jones (she/they)



#### Chiara Moore (she/her)





Luying Xu (she/her)




Vincenzo Lamagna.
